Course Description

This course is an introduction to the design and development of web-based human-computer interaction (HCI) interfaces. The coursework is comprised of five exercises and three studio projects. The topics addressed by these activities include visual layout, file management, code syntax, and interaction design. These activities offer significant opportunity for professional development. Students participate in critique sessions as a means of informing an iterative design process.

Course Objectives

- Apply principles of design in creating layouts for web-based HCI interfaces.
- Demonstrate competency manipulating and optimizing common file types.
- Design human-computer interfaces representing a worldview other than one's own.
- Employ best practices for file management in interactive projects.
- Use contemporary coding language syntax to markup the structure of content.
- Use contemporary coding language syntax to style the presentation of content.
- Apply contemporary coding languages and strategies to determine interface behavior.
- Analyze, discuss, and evaluate layouts and user experiences of web-based HCI interfaces.
